Dear Mr. Foty:

The Select Subcommittee to Investigate the Remaining Questions Surrounding January 6, 2021, is conducting oversight of the events that occurred at the Capitol and the response and subsequent investigations conducted by various law-enforcement entities. According to the Statements of Disbursements of the House of Representatives, the House Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the United States Capitol (January 6th Select Committee) received services from Design in DC.¹ As such, we believe that you may possess footage and documents critical to our oversight and we request your voluntary cooperation with our inquiry.

Last Congress, an investigation led by then-House Administration Oversight Subcommittee Chairman Barry Loudermilk found that the January 6th Select Committee left video footage unaccounted for and that many documents were missing or deleted.² For example, the January 6th Select Committee failed to archive over one terabyte of digital data³ and former Select Subcommittee Chairman Bennie Thompson conceded that he withheld footage of witness interviews and depositions.⁴ To date, Representative Thompson has failed to account for the missing footage and data.

Design in DC is a digital experiences company, offering services including website and application development.⁵ Between July 2022 and March 2023, the January 6th Select Committee paid Design in DC nearly \$2 million for “Consultant Contract Services.”⁶ Due to the extensive services Design in DC provided to the January 6th Select Committee, we believe that Design in DC possesses information that is necessary to further our oversight. Accordingly, please produce the following documents and information for the period from July 1, 2021, to the present:

1. All video and audio footage received by Design in DC pertaining to the events of January 6, 2021, including but not limited to video recordings of witness interviews, transcribed interviews, and depositions;
2. All video and audio footage recorded or produced by Design in DC for the January 6th Select Committee;
3. All documents, including any copies of transcripts, provided to Design in DC employees by Members, staff, or others associated with the January 6th Select Committee; and
4. All documents Design in DC provided to the January 6th Select Committee.

Please produce the requested information as soon as possible, but no later than 5:00 p.m. on October 2, 2025. Furthermore, this letter serves as a formal request to preserve all existing and future records and materials relating to the topics addressed in this letter. You should construe this preservation notice as an instruction to take all reasonable steps to prevent the destruction or alteration, whether intentionally or negligently, of all documents, communications, and other information, including electronic information and metadata, that are or may be responsive to this congressional inquiry. This instruction includes all electronic messages sent using your official and personal accounts or devices, including records created using text messages, phone-based message applications, or encryption software.

H. Res. 605 authorized the Select Subcommittee “to conduct a full and complete investigation and study and issue a final report of the events surrounding January 6, 2021 regarding matters within the jurisdiction of the Committee on the Judiciary under clause 1(l) of rule X of the Rules of the House of Representatives.”⁷ Pursuant to the Rules of the House of Representatives, the Committee on the Judiciary has jurisdiction over criminal law enforcement and criminal justice matters in the United States to inform potential legislative reforms.⁸
